

Subject: Government and Politics

What the subject is about:

The study of Government and Politics encourages young people to develop knowledge and understanding of the political systems in which they live. It involves discussion, debate and disagreement. Some view it as being about conflict and the resolution of conflict. Students will develop a greater awareness of current affairs.
